Most of the boys will now progress onto U10 next year and I am confident that they will continue to develop the skills and the love of the sport.

The Under 10 hurling year started off as always with pre-season training on Friday evenings in the sports halls of St Marks school. Attendance from the off was encouraging with great numbers regularly practising the basics skills in anticipation of the coming spring/summer outdoor season.

The outdoor season started after Easter this year with St Marks being the regular hive of hurling and camogie activity on Friday evenings.

The all-county blitz were held on the first Saturday of the month and a regional blitz were held on the third Saturday. We started the year off away to Laitroim for the first all-county blitz, and then attended blitz's hosted by An Riocht, Portaferry, Shamrocks, Carryduff, Bredagh, Clonduff Castlewellan and Glassdrumman.

Saturday 7th September was our turn to host the all-county blitz which again was to be the biggest (and best) blitz of the 2024 calendar hosted in St Marks. This year we had 14 pitches playing simultaneously as for the first time we had invited u6 participants. Our juvenile volunteers refereed the u10.5 matches.

During the course of the day I had time catch a glimpse of the U6 teams competing, and my lasting memory was of Tom Daly's excitement and joy at the sight of such young hurlers competing in and enjoying their matches, little was I to know this day would be the last time I personally got to have a chat with Tom (RIP).

Over the course of this year our u10 hurlers played teams from the Ards, Antrim, Armagh, Monaghan, Louth, Belfast, Saul, Kilclief, Liatroim, and our near neighbours Shamrocks, Clann Mhurn, Clonduff, and a Hurling/Football challenge with Ashbourne from Co. Meath.

This year we were delighted to be invited to Feile An Fhomhair hosted by Eire Og in Carrickmore. This is a prestige's annual tournament, and our boys played up to the potential that we all know they had. Beating the hosts in the first game they went on to beat other teams from within Ulster including the eventual shield winners. The Cup semi-final line-up was Cushendall v Loughguille, Eire Og v CPN, but unfortunately our lads were beaten by the smallest of margins (1pt). Each and everyone of the squad played with skill and bravery and should be extremely proud of their achievement.

Despite scores not being recorded in the county blitz's, it was noted by coaches, players and parents alike that the number of games that finished in disappointment during the course of the year could have been counted on one hand, and as such the progress made by the boys from 2023 was also very evident for all to see and their skill levels have increased to the extent that a number of u10.5's were given the opportunity to play up with the U12 teams, whilst the rest have shown marked improvement and will be available for playing up if required in 2025.

The U12 hurlers had a fantastic season in 2024. Approaching the 2024 season the management team knew that we had an extremely talented team, albeit low in numbers with only 10 actual U12 players. Much effort has been made to increase playing numbers via primary school programmes in both St Dallan's and Carrick PS, but numbers continue to be a problem. To counteract this, a number of older U10's (children who would be U12 under the date of birth rules) were called up to the U12 hurling squad, on the basis of clashes with football were

avoided. As was portrayed in the U10 report, we are fortunate that the work over recent years is beginning to show, with a talented group of U10's to call upon. The U10 lads did not look out of place with the U12's and when managed correctly these players excelled with both U10's and U12's.

Throughout the season the U12's competed against the best teams Co Down has to offer, and we can deservedly be considered amongst the strongest teams in the county at this age group. U12 sport is not about winning, and scores are not kept, it is with great pleasure that we witnessed every player improve throughout the season. This team possesses a group of determined and committed players, with several very talented players who can continue to improve and compete with anyone in the county.

Regarding the afore mentioned primary school hurling programme, credit must go to the hurling committee for committing to regular hurling in both feeder schools, St Dallan's PS and Carrick PS. The management were pleased to see Carrick PS finish top of the South Down indoor blitz and qualify for the all-county finals. St Dallans too should have joined Carrick in the final and only missed out on qualification by 1 point. We have high hopes for St Dallans in 2024/25 Primary School hurling and we expect Carrick to also come close when winners are decided.

Much like the U12's, the U14s do not possess many players, as such the decision was made to amalgamate with local rivals Newry Shamrocks to form Patrick Rankin. This has ensured that U14 hurlers from CPN have been afforded regular hurling at their correct age group, and without having to rely on U12's to field a team. This is the second year of the amalgamation and credit must go to both clubs for making a union of two traditional rivals to flourish. With a playing panel of 15 between both clubs, only two are over age in 2025, as such hopes are high for next season already that this team can compete and challenge in Division 1. Back to 2024 for now, the U14's played in Division 2 of the Down league and for such a young team we competed well in the league, mainly playing teams with older players. We played 14 league games and won 7, this left us 4th in a table of 8 teams. During the league we had some very encouraging displays against Kilclief, Castlewellan and Killeavy (Armagh). This set us up nicely for the championship where we go to the final of the shield but unfortunately lost narrowly at home to Ballycran in the semi final.

The U14's provided four players to the County Down 'Be Better Programme' set up to promote hurling across the county and a precursor to potential future county juvenile teams. We look forward to seeing how these young lads and all the players progress in the coming years.

The management would like to wish the team every success in the future and believe with hard work, next year's report will be telling a story of a team who excelled in both league and championship.
